SCHOLARSHIPS & TEEN OUTREACH

JA AWARDS SCHOLARSHIPS TO AREA STUDENTS, SUPPORTS LEADERSHIP

Believing that education is a key to fulfilling The Junior Auxiliary of Hattiesburg's mission of "care today - character tomorrow", Junior Auxiliary of Hattiesburg regularly awards scholarships to students from Forrest and Lamar county area schools. These scholarships are given directly to the student's school of choice in order to assist with the cost of higher education.

Scholarships are awarded based on the applicant's qualifications, and each scholarship recipient receives \$1,000. Junior Auxiliary emphasizes youth community service efforts in its award criteria. Students who demonstrate active involvement in community service efforts through school, church, and other service-oriented groups are ideal applicants. In addition to service efforts, applications are chosen by a committee based on academic achievement with sensitivity to need.

CROWN CLUB

From August to April each school year, approximately 50-60 female area high school students in 10th through 12th grades volunteer service hours on various Junior Auxilary of Hattiesburg projects. Each participant is required to dedicate 12 service hours each year. A mininum of 720 service hours results from this teen outreach organization.

Projects Supported: Pennington's Night Out, Night to Shine, Children's Center Carnival, Empty Bowls, Little Free Library, Edwards Street Fellowship Center Food Pantry, and Backpack Blessings.

PRIMARY FUNDRAISER: ANNUAL CHARITY BALL

Since its inception, fundraising has provided the means for Junior Auxiliary of Hattiesburg to fulfill its mission of uplifting children and families in need through acts of service. Throughout the year, members are dedicated to the success of JA's service projects, which provide an estimate \$100,000 in local impact each year. Combined, JA members dedicate more than 4,000 service hours to children and families in Hattiesburg through its chapter volunteer work.

Each fall, Junior Auxiliary hosts an annual charity ball as its primary fundraiser. Through the generosity and support of donors and attendees, JA's outreach projects are made possible.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT DIAPER BANK SERVES 3,600 FAMILIES
